#### Integrating Literacy at Daniel Morgan Technology Center

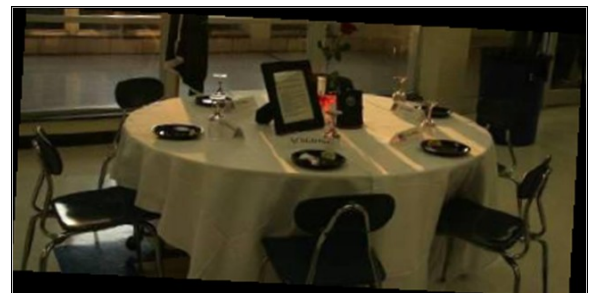

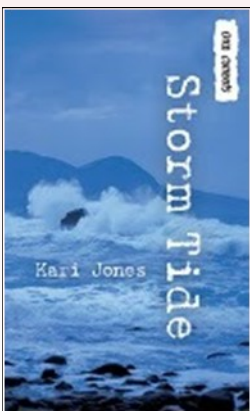
## Reading at Pacolet Elementary School

## Comprehension Strategy—Visualizing

**Definition of Visualizing** *Authors use words to help you see what is happening in the writing. When you visualize, you create a picture in your mind. The writing comes to life for you.*

Open ended statements to use to help set the mood for visualizing might include: "Even though it isn't in the

picture, I can see the..."; "I can picture the ..."; "I can imagine what it is like to," "I think that ... must have..."

Visualizing is often accomplished more readily with fiction than in expository text. Nonfiction expository text relies on the concepts: size, length, time lines, weight, distance and diagrams.

Comparison of some of these are good places to start with drawings or statements.

During November, patriotic books that tell words of the *The Star-Spangled Banner*, *American the Beautiful* and others will provide appropriate material for the skill of visualization.

## Young Adult Book Pick: Storm Tide by Kari Jones

Left alone for the first time on the island he calls home, Simon is looking forward to a day of personal indulgence.

His sister Ellen only wants to make sure they get their chores done. Their parents are busy trying to convince the government not to close the lighthouse that the family

operates, and it's up to the kids to make sure everything runs smoothly.

Neither Simon nor Ellen are prepared for the mysterious and potentially dangerous visitor who brings with him an unexpected storm and a riddle that may lead to treasure—treasure that could

help them save the lighthouse.

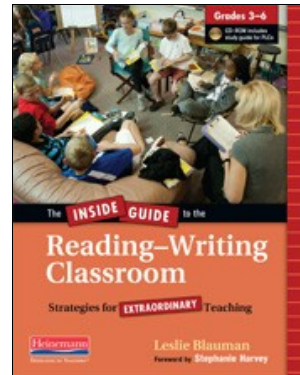

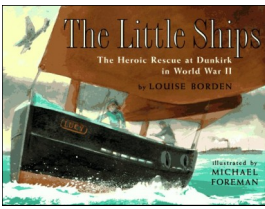

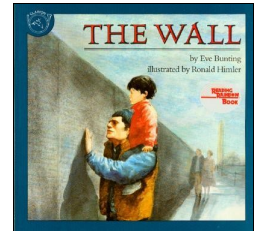


#### [The Little Ships: The Heroic Rescue at Dunkirk in World War II](#) (ages 7-10) by Louise Borden

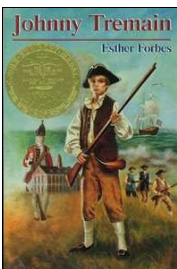
In this delightful picture book, Borden describes one of the most dramatic endeavors of World War II through the eyes of a child. A young English girl sails with her father when he joins the daring effort. She describes the risks along the way, as well as the awe-inspiring spectacle of more than 300,000 troops making their way back to safety aboard small, private vessels.

#### [The Wall](#) (ages 4-8) By Eve Bunting

A father and his young son visit the Vietnam Veterans Memorial to find the name of the grandfather the boy never met. In this brief, richly-illustrated story, Bunting captures the significance of the Memorial in child-like terms. Written for the youngest audiences, this work is a must read for children and adults alike.



### For Older Children, Tweens, and Young Teens

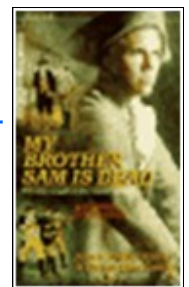


#### [Johnny Tremain](#) (ages 9-14) by Esther Forbes

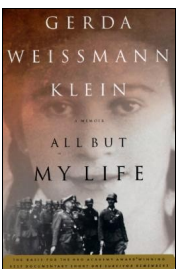
Forbes' award-winning tale of a young silversmith's apprentice thrust into the middle of the Revolutionary War has proven a favorite for more than fifty years. The novel touches on the horrors of battle, and some scenes might be disturbing to young readers. For older readers, however, the novel provides an excellent glimpse into life along the battle lines. Differing from the novel in points, but also worthwhile is [the classic Disney movie based on the book](#).

#### [My Brother Sam Is Dead](#) (ages 9-14) by James Lincoln Collier and Christopher Collier

In this award-winning novel, young Tim is caught between his father's Tory sympathies and his brother's allegiance to the Patriot cause. Young readers see the human impact of the Revolutionary War through the eyes of a character their own age, as Tim's father perishes aboard a British prison ship and his brother is killed in battle.



### For Older Teens and Adults

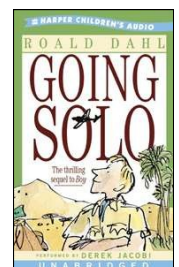


#### [All But My Life](#) (ages 14 and up) by Gerda Weissmann Klein

A young lady when World War II ripped through her homeland, this Jewish author recalls her enslavement by the Nazis and ultimate liberation by American soldiers. Originally written for adult audiences, this work has gained a place in countless school reading programs. The non-fictional account contains some disturbing passages that wouldn't be suitable for young audiences, however.

#### [Going Solo](#) (ages 12 and up) Roald Dahl

Turning from his typical tales to a more serious topic, best-loved children's author Roald Dahl writes of his own experiences as a pilot during World War II in this book geared toward young adult readers.



## Thanksgiving Books

### AGES 4-8

**1, 2, 3, Thanksgiving!** by W. Nikola-Lisa, illustrated by Robin Kramer - This counting book leads children through Papa's one fat turkey, Mama's two pumpkin pies, and so on as the family sits down to a Thanksgiving feast.

**Albert's Thanksgiving** by Leslie Tryon - After helping the children of Pleasant Valley plant a garden, Albert, the hard-working school handy-duck, has great difficulty in harvesting the vegetables before the Thanksgiving feast, because everyone has something else for him to do.

**Arthur's Thanksgiving** by Marc Brown Arthur - finds his role as director of the Thanksgiving play a difficult one, especially since no one will agree to play the turkey.

**Cranberry Thanksgiving** by Wende Devlin, Harry Devlin - Maggie and her grandmother each invite a guest to their Thanksgiving feast, featuring Grandmother's own cranberry bread, made from a secret recipe.

**Gracias, the Thanksgiving Turkey** by Joy Cowley, illustrated by Joe Cepeda - Miguel's father gets him a turkey to fatten up for Thanksgiving, and soon the boy and bird are firmly attached. But what will become of his friend on the day of reckoning?

**How Many Days to America? : A Thanksgiving Story** by Eve Bunting, illustrated by Beth Peck - After the police come, the family is forced to flee their Caribbean island and set sail for America in a small fishing boat. Other refugees crowd the boat and the voyage is a long one, but when the family finally arrives they discover it's a special day in more ways than one.

**Molly's Pilgrim** by Barbara Cohen, illustrated by Daniel M. Duffy - Russian emigre Molly is embarrassed by her mother's attempts to help with her Thanksgiving project. She makes a pilgrim doll--but dresses it in Russian clothing. Soon, however, Molly learns that it takes all kinds of "pilgrims" to make a Thanksgiving.

**Pilgrim's First Thanksgiving** by Ann McGovern - Somewhat longer picture book that explains voyage of the Pilgrims, their becoming friends with Squanto, and the first feast.

### AGES 9-12

**1621 A New Look at Thanksgiving** by Catherine O'Neill Grace, Margaret M. Bruchac with Plimoth Plantation - This book uses maps, recipes and photographs of historical reenactments to debunk the myths of Thanksgiving. It presents new, factual information in a clear, well-written manner.

**The First Thanksgiving** by Jean Craighead George, illustrated by Thomas Locker - The story of the Pilgrims is vividly retold in simple language for beginning readers

### AGES 12 AND BEYOND

**Thanksgiving: The Pilgrims' First Year in America** by Glenn Cheney *Thanksgiving* is not a book about a holiday. It's about something that a few dozen survivors did after a year of suffering, death, struggle, and courage. They bowed their heads to give thanks. The Pilgrims journey began as a joint venture of business and religion, but soon it became a matter of survival.

**The Mayflower and Her Passengers** by Caleb Johnson. - The book begins with original, never before published information about the *Mayflower* ship itself, and its history before and after she became the famous vessel that brought the Pilgrims to America. The remainder of the book consist of short biographies of each passenger or family group that came on the *Mayflower*—the first attempt to create individual biographies for each of the passengers or family groups.
